

IT'S BYE, BYE BIRDIE IN THE ATLANTA OPEN

Dahlbender Hums Another 69, Routs the Field at Druid Hills

Refusing to wobble after a double bogey six on the second hole where he sniped his drive into the trees, Gene Dahlbender Jr. Monday played five-under-par golf from that point on to capture the 1963 Atlanta Open Golf championship by nine strokes.

Dahlbender exhibited his customary control of the Druid Hills course. He tapped in a 25-footer for a birdie on the fourth, lost the stroke by missing a three-foot putt on the fifth, then worked out an easy birdie on the seventh for a 37 at the turn.

He rapped in a birdie at the tenth after one of his bee-line approach shots; recovered from a pushed drive for an easy birdie at the 12th; pitched dead for two more birdies at the 14th and 16th for a 69 to match the one he shot last week at Peachtree Golf Club. His 138 total was in a niche of its own.

Second place and top professional money went to E2 Robert Zimmerman, of Uncle Sam's Army at Fort McPherson. Zimmerman, who was the nation's second low qualifier for last year's U.S. Open at Cincinnati, O., hewed himself an even par 72 for a 147 total. Zimmerman's home is in Dayton, O. He will again try for the U.S. Open in Judge Charlie Murphy's initial tryouts June 11 at East Lake.

ZIMMERMAN was two under par through six holes, missed an-

other birdie chance by chipping short on the par five seventh. He took his first bogey when he missed the green of the par three eighth and, disturbed by a moving caddy, hit a "walking" chip on six feet or so.

Remembering his short chip on the seventh, he over-chipped on the ninth to make the turn in par 36. He added another immaculate par 36 coming home.

Bill Hardigree, professional at Pine Tree Country Club's O. B. Keeler course, match the day's second best performance with a 71 and took second pro money of \$200 for his 78-71-149. Defending champion Wayne Yates was third low pro, tying with amateurs Lefty Ewing and Buddy Rice at 150, one stroke ahead of his dad, Jim Yates, Candler Park professional, who finished with 151. This gave him a tie with professional George Preisinger, of Capital City, who had a round of refusing putts, and amateurs Bob Smith and David Govea.
