

BOWDEN'S MOORE COMES IN FOURTH

Idle Hour's Bob Hayes Captures State Pro Golfers' Championship

Bob Hayes, pro at Idle Hour Country Club, shook off the effects of a pulled leg-muscle and went on to fire a one-under-par 71 to take the Georgia PGA Championship at Bowden Municipal Golf Course Tuesday.

Hayes, who grabbed off an opening-day lead in the Tournament Monday, put together a 35 and a 36 for his 71 Monday. He had fired a blistering three-under-par 69 Monday to take a one-stroke lead into the final 18-hole set Tuesday.

He pulled a muscle in his right leg on the 13th tee, which had him limping through the rest of the match, but which failed to dampen his determined bid for the title.

His total for the 36 holes was 140, the only sub-par score turned in for the entire route.

Going into the Tuesday final, Elmer Reed of Atlanta, defending champion, carried a two-under-par 70 into Tuesday's match, but met his Waterloo on the back side of the Bowden Course.

On the front nine, Reed, who entered the Tournament to defend his title only at the last minute Monday, fired a two-under-34.

His attack floundered on the back nine, however, when he bogeyed the final two holes and came in with a 32, for a 36-hole total of 72. Coupled with his 70 of Monday, it gave him a 143 for the Tournament, three strokes off the pace of the smooth-swinging Hayes.

Tied with Reed in second place was Barry Ward, who fired an even-par 72 Tuesday to go with his 71 Monday for a 143 total.

Fourth place in the Tournament was taken by the host pro, Hugh Moore Jr., of Bowden Municipal Golf Course.

Moore had a rough time of it in the Monday round, firing a 76 to go into the second half trailing the leaders.

Tuesday, however, he poured on the coal and came through with a three-under-par 69, the finest second-day score turned in. This

gave him a 145 for the Tournament, for fourth place.

In fifth place was Bob Bissett of Atlanta, with a 73-73, 146, followed by Matt Warren of Savannah, with a 72-75, 147. Warren is president of the Georgia PGA.

Going with the crown from this, the 11th Georgia PGA Tournament, was \$100 first-place money for Hayes. Reed and Ward split \$110 and Moore carried \$50 home. Bissett took \$40 and \$25 went to Warren.

Barons, Bears Score Victories In Loop Play-Off

Birmingham and Mobile, the two-team teams in regular season play, scored impressive victories in the opening round of the Southern Assn. playoffs.

Pennant - winning Birmingham last night treated a home turnout of 3,949 fans to a seven-run fourth inning and trounced Chattanooga 10-2. Mobile pleased 2,354 Bear fans with a 7-1 victory over the Atlanta Crackers.

Schaeffer stopped Atlanta on five hits for Mobile and blanked the Crackers until the eighth inning.

Birmingham had already staked the fast-balling Grzenda to a 3-1 lead when the fourth-inning offensive began. The Barons batted around during a furious assault on Don Mimick and Bob Thollander. Lou Limmer's three-run homer was the big blow.

PRINCETON IS IVY FAVORITE

Army, Navy, Penn Favored To Rule Roost in East

NEW YORK (UPI) — Army, Navy and Penn State — not necessarily in that order — are favored to rule the East in college football this fall.

Army has the backs. Navy has the depth and Penn State has a little bit of everything needed to go all the way with one slight reservation. The only rap the experts can pin on Penn State this early is "lack of team speed" and that may or may not be significant.

Princeton is the choice over Dartmouth in the Ivy League. Rutgers, which employs an exact scale - model of Princeton's single wing system, looks like the class of the Middle Atlantic Conference. Williams is the power in the Little Three. Rhode Island and Connecticut in the Yankee Conference.

But among the major independents, where the true strength of the area lies, the two service academies and Penn State have the stuff to catch the eye of early season forecasters over Syracuse, Holy Cross, Pittsburgh and Boston College.

(the Cotton Bowl. For ball-otters, Eddie Erelitz had Dick Dugan, pat, Roland Brandquist and Dick Zembruzski along with Welborn. Penn State, with a re-shuffled but experienced line, pins its high hopes on the best group of quarterbacks on any squad in the East. Coach Rip Engle has not one, two or three but four able signal callers and that's real dream stuff. His veterans are Al Jacks, Richie Lucas and Bob Scrabas. Add to them sophomore Dick Hook and there's depth aplenty for any emergency.

At Syracuse, veteran quarterback Chuck Zimmermann is the key man in an outfit well-fixed—six returning starters among 18 lettermen — everywhere but at the ends.

Holy Cross, with perhaps the East's standout T-quarterback in Tom Greene, is handicapped by lack of spring practice but Greene will operate behind a fine line led by guard Jim Henley. The Crusaders figure to be rough to handle.

Pittsburgh has a pair of fine quarterbacks in Bill Kaliden and Ivan Tomasic but, with a back-breaking schedule, may be a year away from big things.

In the Ivy League, Princeton had losses in the line and at quarterback where three-year starter John Sapoch left a big hole. However, the Tigers apparently have found an able quarterback replacement in Dean Locks and an inspirational tailback in Danny Sachs to push the wing advance. Also returning is fullback Fred Tiley to provide that vitally needed up-the-middle power.

It's highly possible the colorful Army-Navy game at Philadelphia on Nov. 22 will carry with it the championship of the East, though both had graduation losses that hurt.

Navy, last year's Eastern champion, lost a sizeable chunk of its "litterbugging" line and all first-string backs except crashing Ray Welborn. But the Middies, while protesting this is a "rebuilding year," have a tough nucleus as well as reserves.

Army again is thin in reserves, particularly in the line, but also has the finest one - two punch anywhere in All-America Bob Anderson, up for his second season, and reserve fullback Dick Dugan.
